SCHOOL BUDGET CUTS

This year, we are praying that public education and services will not become the scapegoat to budget cuts proposed by our leaders in Annapolis and Prince George's County.

Buses with students, parents, Prince Georgians, and your truly, for the past weeks have lobbied in Annapolis, and Prince George's for full funding of the following:

- Restore \$85 million to Prince George's County FY2012 Education Budget;
- Proposed \$155 million deficit would cause the following cuts or furloughs:
- 1100 positions
- 200-400 classroom teachers
- Increase in class size
- Reduction in the following:
- JROTC (\$20 million cut)
- Middle School athletics
- Switching pre-kindergarten programs from full-day to half-day and eliminating Reading Recovery, which is highly effective, for low achieving first graders, according to Reading Recovery Council of North America.

It is said that "funding cuts will hurt Prince George's County more than any other school district in the state." Can we afford this?

FHHS 60th Anniversary Rated "One Of The Best"

The alumni sponsored celebration at Martins Crosswinds in Greenbelt for Fairmont heights high School's 60th Anniversary on October 22, 2010, in the words of more than 400 participants, "it was the best!!"

Hosted by former Senator Tommie Broadwater, a Fairmont Heights graduate and first African American senator from Prince George's County, the affair brought back memories of Fairmont Heights High School since 1950. It was the second of only two high schools in the county for Black students. The first was Frederick Douglass High School in Upper Marlboro. The school remained segregated until 1973.

Many said the school was "an outstanding place to be" and held Fairmont's first principal, Mr. G. James Gholson, in High esteem as a "visionary educator" who, like a second parent, brought order and discipline to the learning process.

A roll-call was made by year, and almost every school year was represented by alumni attendants. True excitement filled the room after a solo entitled "Memory" by alumnus, Joseph Parker, Sr. Past memories were recalled by keynote Speaker, James W. Dyke, Jr., 1964 alumnus, Secretary of Education under former Virginia Governor, L. W. Wilder, and graduate of Howard University School of Law, JD, cum laude, in 1971. Dr. Dyke is presently a law partner with McGuire Woods in McLean, VA., who has received five Honorary Doctor of Law degrees.

Many former faculty and staff members attended the celebration, including Mrs. Lorenza Robinson, and Mrs. Rosemary Brinkley, who introduced the Keynote Speaker, and present Principal, Mrs. Nakia Nicholson, who sang a solo, "I Won't Complain".

Among the 25 departed alumni and veterans, special tributes were paid to former faculty and administrator, Mr. Simon L. Alsop, who transition this life on June 15, 2010, and Elizabeth Gordon, '52, who dedicated her life to her church and alma mater until her transition on December 10, 2009. Newly Organized Fairmont Heights Veterans Growing



A newly organized group of veterans, called Fairmont Heights Veterans Association, not to be confused with the Veterans of Fairmount Heights Town, whose members go back as far as World War II, was launched by four Fairmont Heights graduates in October 2009.

James Staggs, a 1966 graduate of Fairmont Heights High School, served in Vietnam from 1967 to 1970. He knew that most veterans were not as lucky as he, who suffers from hypertension, as a result of post-traumatic stress disorder. His concern was that many men who returned still suffer from combat-related illnesses. His dream has been to do something for the other veterans in the area. The group is designed to act as a support group to local veterans who are unaware of available benefits.

The group of four has increased to twenty-eight, including four women. The group was immediately recruited as a member of the Fairmont Heights High School Alumni Association. FHHS has been officially designated as a historic site by the Historic Preservation Commission and approved by the Prince George's County Council as of June 08, 2010. The veterans association will be a part of the new site. Members are not limited to Fairmont Heights graduates. The group meets temporarily at 2:00PM on the last Saturday of each month at the Glenarden American Legion Post #275 at 8201 Martin Luther King Jr. Highway.
