G. JAMES GHOLSON A LEGEND REMEMBERED AND HONORED



(July 20, 1912-December 3, 2006)

A service of thanksgiving and remembrance for Mr. G. James Gholson was held at St. Barnabas' Church, Leeland, in Upper Marlboro, MD on December 9, 2006. The service was preempted by a Resolution Proclamation from the Maryland Senate with words from the Governor of Maryland, which was presented by Senator Nathaniel Exum (D), 24th Legislative District, and was read by the church Officiant.

Most of the alumni and community will remember him as the first Principal of Fairmont Heights High School, whose leadership and lifetime commitment to education and democracy in Prince George's County began in 1950.

Others will remember him as a master of teachers, whose exemplary programs attracted attention of officials from all over the world, having organized a new secondary school, consolidating several junior high schools and one senior high school in the county. In 1970, he was appointed Administrative Assistant for Administration in Prince Georges County. In 1972 during the Desegregation Suit vs. Prince George's County Schools, he was named Special Assistant to the Superintendent for Desegregation of Prince Georges County Public Schools. In that capacity he headed 21 educators and community leaders charged with developing and implementing a plan for improving race relations throughout the school system.

In 1973 Mr. Gholson was appointed Assistant Superintendent for Administration of the Northern Area for the Prince Georges County Schools with oversight of 75 schools. After his retirement in 1979, his activities and involvement did not slow down, but continued at full speed. The list would fill a book. He began a 12 year term as Secretary of the Board for the Collington Life Care Community, where he was serving in 2006 as Chairman of Collington's Personnel Committee.

He was recognized and honored by numerous organizations, and was selected as the 1990 Prince Georgian of the Year and was given the William S. Schmidt Award for Services to Youth, as well as was presented the 1973 Citizen of the Year Award by Omega Psi Phi Fraternity.

His list of membership in organizations would fill an encyclopedia, in addition to having served seven years as a member of Steny Hoyer' Service Academies Selection Committee and as Trustee of the Middle States Association of School Administrators, Phi Delta Kappa and Alpha Phi Alpha.

Mr. Gholson was a lover of painting and some of his works were exhibited throughout the community. He loved to read and was active in reading clubs at Prince Georges Community College until his illness prevented him from continuing. At the age of 94, he was very alert and aware of local and world events. We will miss him, but his name is engraved, not only on a school in his honor, but most importantly, his memory is engraved on the hearts of hundreds of thousands who knew him or knew of him during their lifetime, especially those of the Fairmont Heights High School family. TWO PUBLIC HEARINGS SCHEDULED ON FATE OF FAIRMONT HEIGHTS HIGH

On February 16, 2006, after many requests by Alumni president, John Williams, local, state, community leaders and FHHS students, the Prince George's Board of Education approved \$2.1 million for needed repairs at FHHS.

In addition, a feasibility study was approved to determine if the school should be renovated or rebuilt at a new location. In December 2006, the results of the study was released.

The decision is a difficult one because of the school's legendary history. During the 2006 National African-American History Month, Prince George's County Schools selected Fairmont Heights High School and alumni to be featured on the internet, as well as on local television (20 pages of history). As well as being the first high school in the county for Black students, FHHS' history includes a list of contributions to the community and society that looks like a "Who's Who". Plans are being made to declare the school a historical site.

The goal of the study is to "determine how best to provide a facility for the students and faculty of Fairmont Heights High School that meets the school's educational needs, learning environment, as well as today's building and life safety needs."

The question is whether to relocate and rebuild at a cost of \$79 million, or to modernize and add needed facilities at an estimated cost of \$51 million.

The FHHS Alumni Association believes we should opt to modernize and replace parts of the building. The building image should not be altered, but restored to its original appearance. The building should be preserved as a symbol of the community's legendary history. FHHS is not just a school, it is a symbol of history for those enrolled at the school, and those not yet born to become alumni of a historical institution.
