The county's minimum requirement for a high school is 30 acres.

The site and construction funds were approved for the new FHHS building at a cost of more than \$14 million. However, politics plus the present economic crisis start the year 2009 with budget cuts and school closures, six schools in the central area of the county. Nearly 900 school jobs may be cut in 2009.

Nevertheless, 2009 brings more hope about the future. We are all elated about the historic election of Barack Obama, as the first African American in nearly 233 years who made "hope" and "change" the bywords of his campaign and his historic inauguration. President Obama challenged all of us to "pick ourselves up, dust ourselves off, and begin to make America what it should be one nation for all."

As Fairmont Heights High School faces it's 60th year in 2010, those who were students, teachers, staff, and family understand crisis and challenges of a segregated society. Thus, as President

G. JAMES GHOLSON INDUCTED INTO THE HALL OF FAME

The legendary G. James Gholson was inducted into Prince George's County Hall of Fame on September 29, 2008.

At a ceremony held at G. James Gholson Middle School (named in his honor), Mr. Gholson, first principal of Fairmont Heights High School in 1950,

was recognized for his role as an educator and in the desegregation of Prince George's County Public Schools. A portrait of Mr. Gholson was unveiled by artist Jim Masters during the ceremony. The portrait will hang in the middle school as a reminder to students and visitors of an educator who demanded excellence of his teachers and students.

Principal Jeff Parker, Delegate Joanne Benson (D.24), alumni of Fairmont Heights High School, and friend spoke of Mr. Gholson as "a role model" who wanted to see all county students, as well as teachers excel.

Mr. Gholson, who was the first Black Asst. Superintendent of the county schools was

called a "Teacher of Teachers". He died on December 03, 2006 and will be honored each year at the alumni memorial service in December.
